PRESIDENT'S REPORT - FEBRUARY 2024

This year went well, with meetings running as planned. Covid and weather-related issues had less impact than in previous years.

Our speakers covered a fascinating variety of topics including Astronomy, weak signal propagation, pre-WW2 stories of taking cars up the Carrington River, the provision of power supply to DMR repeaters and several presentations on aspects of antenna design and construction.

The constructors evening in September was well supported, as was a round table briefing on SOTA, with associated discussion of equipment and antenna options.

Individual members and the club participated in a variety of contests and events. We will compete again in the Jock White Field Day. The Lighthouse Weekend in August also went well.

Fund Raising is always a focus for the committee. This year, members helped staff the gates at the A&P Show and supported the Wine and Food Festival. A big thank you to all who contributed. These events are the bulk of our income. Our subscriptions are significantly lower as a result.




QSL MANAGER'S REPORT - 2024

WEBMASTER / LIBRARIAN REPORT

Our website, ZL2KS.org.nz, has now been going for 8 years (set up in 2016), and there have been no problems that I'm aware of in the last year. As per previous years, not much has changed in the last year.

I'm not sure on the numbers of people using the site, there are stats available, but many hits are not from real persons. I've not had any feedback in the last year, so assume everyone is fairly happy.

We are using about 600 Mb, a bit over half of what we've got available (1 Gb), we paid \$84.40 (\$25 for the domain name, and \$59.40 for the webhosting) for this in 2023, the same as in 2022. It's going to increase this coming year to about \$110 in total.

Every month the newsletter is put on the site, and occasionally some other information is added or updated. There are currently 13 pages on the site, with information on our repeaters, remote HF-station, newsletter, some committee matters, AREC, and some presentations. If there is anything you feel we need to add please let the committee know and it will be considered.

On the library front not much to report either for 2023, it's still available to members, but no requests for books were received. An overview of the material held is available on our website. Bill ZL2AYZ regularly brings in the RSGB RadCom and some other magazines for members to take home and share. These have not been added to the library, but are a welcome addition to the 'floating' collection, please bring them along for others to look through once you have had them for a while.

MARLBOROUGH AMATEUR RADIO CLUB REPEATER REPORT 2023/2024

VHF Blenheim 695 Repeater

Status: Fully operational with no issues reported.

VHF Picton 7225 Repeater

Status: Fully Operational, currently using long-term loan batteries.

VHF Ward 560 Repeater

Status: Operational, potential intermittent fault observed.

Reports vary, with some indicating non-responsiveness and others normal operation. Also scratching and after my finding of the coax fitting on 690 makes you think.

Request for Assistance: All members who are within range of 560 are asked if they can help monitor Ward 560, as it is currently out of range from my location. Thanks

Action: Based on collective monitoring feedback, a plan will be formulated and a site visit might be required.

VHF Kaikoura 690 Repeater

Status: Online at temporary location, operating without a duplexer and utilizing separate TX and RX antennas.

I have now acquired a new enclosure for the repeater and going to fit rack mount system.

Issues Identified: Significant internal corrosion within the filter cavities, open circuit coax "tee."

Current Actions: Pending approval from the committee, efforts will be underway to open and clean the cavity, with plans to re-polish if possible.

Request for Assistance: It would be good if people could use this repeater, if possible, to put some

usage time and voice traffic through it and report any issues. Thanks.

Detailed Findings and Actions: I set up the 690 on the test bench on the hill-top and installed the main antenna and link antenna. It is powered by an NS70 battery on a mains power charger. The repeater is online and can be used, but it may not link. I have received reports that Kaikoura 690 was, in fact, linking to Ward 560, but I have not been able to verify this. Also, given the potential of 560 to have a fault, this has made the conclusion more difficult.

There was an issue with the repeater receiving overwhelming white noise, which was wiping out the received station calling the repeater. I isolated it down to what I thought to be a duplexer issue. I was talking to ZL2TW and concluded it should be checked for alignment. Before starting on alignment I wanted to first check the mechanical state because I was very concerned about the surface corrosion on the top of the filters, and after connecting my VNA and running a series of tests, I concluded there were major problems. The VNA showed a very low Q value and strange resonances which did not make sense. After some amount of testing, I found one of the filters coax "tees" open circuit. After replacing and retesting with the VNA, the duplexer was not much better.

I removed one of the blanking plugs in the top of one of the filter cavities and was horrified to find the level of corrosion inside the cavity; there was at least two tablespoons of white powder in the bottom. The only option for me now is to try to open the cavity so I can try to clean and re-polish if possible, please see below the best photos I could through a small hole.

After cutting the coax "tee" open I found the side connection only touching (sometimes) the side of the through conductor

I have a new enclosure for the repeater that I am working on installing a rack mount system into, and insulating, and painting green to match the existing.



AREC REPORT

We still work very closely with CD with Ron, Graeme and myself upgrading the antenna system at the fire station in Okiwi Bay, which improved communications from there remarkedly. This involved 3 trips overall to carry out testing of what fixed repeaters we could access, with eventually having 3 different channels from there. A vast improvement from the previous set up.

JOCK WHITE FIELD DAY REPORT 2024

Another great Branch 22 effort with ZL2KS being active on the weekend 24 and 25 February from our usual site down the end of Dillons Point Rd. A wee hitch when Don and John arrived on site, the gate to the field was locked, with the owner's permission the gate was lifted off its hinges and we were in.

Set up this year was a bit tricky with a pretty strong nor'wester. The tent suffered a minor tear due to the wind, this will need a trip to Brooks Brothers for a repair. The 80 meter dipole was held up as usual by lan's telescoping irrigation pipe creation and 40 metres this year was on a 10 metre fibre glass ex US military pole. Fortunately Stuart realised early enough that he had left the power lead for the IC7300 in town to retrieve it in time before the start. Plenty of coax allowed the antennas to be widely separated as usual.

We had plenty of helpers for the set up, some who just came out for set up and tear down which was much appreciated. We had several new faces present this year which was great, let's get you all operating next year!

The wind died down not long after operating started at 1500. There was a brief bit of rain overnight but everything dried out in the morning. We had quite a social gathering Saturday afternoon after set up and the leftover meat from the Xmas BBQ was enjoyed with the help of Don's BBQ in the evening.

Bill and Gary stayed overnight on site and were joined by Russ at 0600 to kick things off on Sunday. Propagation on 40 metres was excellent this year however 80 metres went down a hole late Sunday morning so making contacts was a struggle up to the end at 1500. Gary and Bill kept the tea and coffee supplied from their mobile accommodations.

Gerard surprised us by demonstrating satellite operations when he produced his hand held Yagi and radio and made two contacts on FM via the ISS repeater and another CubeSat.

Bill has already scored this year's entry with preliminary results: 80m: 209 phone and 113 CW contacts with 30 phone and 9 CW multipliers 40m: 266 phone and 122 CW contacts with 30 phone and 11 CW multipliers. This is a similar result to last year but note that the multiplier numbers normally drop as some are invalid.

Unfortunately it looks like ZL3RR, North Canterbury will have beaten us again this year in the midland (Canterbury, West Coast and Nelson-Marlborough) section, looking at the numbers they were giving out.

Thanks again to all those who loaned gear for the weekend, transported the gear to the site and to all who came

out to the site to help operate, set up, tear down and to sit around and chat. Field Day is something we need to make an effort for every year, we are a radio club after all!

IMPORTING LICENSE FOR UNRESTRICTED TWO-WAY RADIOS

For quite a few years you have needed to have a license to import radio transmitting equipment. Getting this license is not hard, and there's no cost either! But there are a few little things that can trip you up. It took me about a month in total, but this was over the Christmas period and another delay in my case.

The RSM uses the RealMe system to control the login to their site. This is easy to get if you are a NZ passport holder, and it can be done on-line. But as I don't have a NZ passport I had to get it the hard way. Filling in on-line forms, getting a code text'ed to me and a photo taken at the AA!

Then onto the RSM website to log into your user account, which I had never done. I thought that as a call-sign holder I'd be in the system, so rather than setting up a new account (via their on-boarding (!) process), I email for help. This was promptly (the same day or the next) given to me. I could now log on and do what I set out to do in the first place.

First up you need to apply for a license to *supply* radio transmitters, there is a link for this on the RSM website: https://www.rsm.govt.nz/about/news-and-updates/licence-to-supply-radio-transmitting-equipment/

Confusingly this is called a license to *supply* radios, but it also covers the *import* of radios. I duly applied for a license and was expecting an email to confirm the issuing of this. After one or two days of no news, I decided to log in and check my account. To my surprise it was listed there that I was an approved supplier and importer!

I knew (from some articles in Break-in by Jim Reed ZL1LC) that there was an extra step to take before you can import unrestricted two-way radios. Unrestricted here means radios that you can program onto any frequency other than the range allocated to us radio amateurs via the front panel or computer.

This step is emailing supply@rsm.govt.nz to apply for an endorsement to your supply/import license. It took a few days to get a reply, but it was nicely worded and it also stipulated the additional requirements of this endorsement. These are that you need to provide a monthly (!) report on your imports and sales. No problem if this is a nil return, as I guess it will be for most amateurs, but it has to be done.

Another slightly strange thing about the importing of radios is that, if you define importing as bringing into the country, you apparently don't need one if you buy a radio from an overseas dealer. This may only apply to Australian dealers? Obviously the aim of the RSM is to limit imports of the unrestricted two-way radios, and these regulations cover that. Sometimes reading these things you can come to different conclusions depending on the emphasis you put on certain words!

Anyway, I've got a Quancheng K6 two-way radio on its way in. The nice thing about this is that with custom firmware you can receive AM/SSB and FM from 18 MHz to over 1 GHz! The AM is nice to have for aircraft traffic, and I miss this on my Boafeng UV-5.

ZL2TW OPERATING PORTABLE FROM THE TIMBER TRAIL

In January Jody and I biked the timber trail, a mountain bike ride in the central North island. The start is at the Pureora forest and finish is near Taumaranui. This is a 2 day trip, 40 km on day 1 and 45 km day 2, with a total 1400 m climb. It is well organised with a ride from the finish where we left the car to the start with our bikes, and overnight bags and food transported for us to the camp Epic at the half way mark, a glamping camp.

At the camp I set up the station pictured, my FT-817 (4 watts) powered by a lithium car jump starter with a long wire and counterpoise earth tuned with a manual ATU. I checked in with the branch 22 80 metre net and could hear everyone well but only Mark and David could hear me well enough to make a contact. The antenna was pretty poor, I couldn't get the end very high, three to four metres max but it shows what can be done operating portable. A better antenna would have made all the difference. I was pretty sore at the end of the trail but still had a few km left in me!
